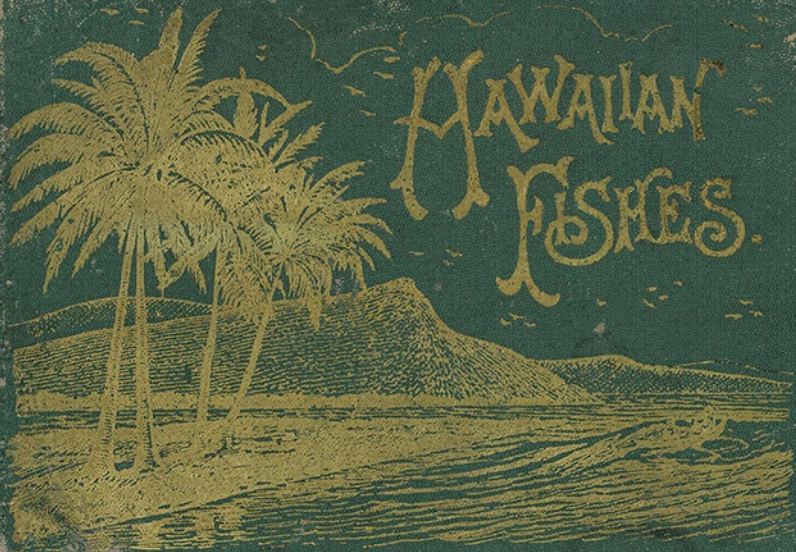

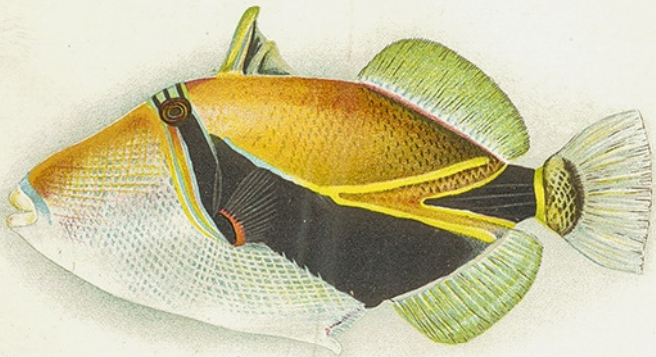

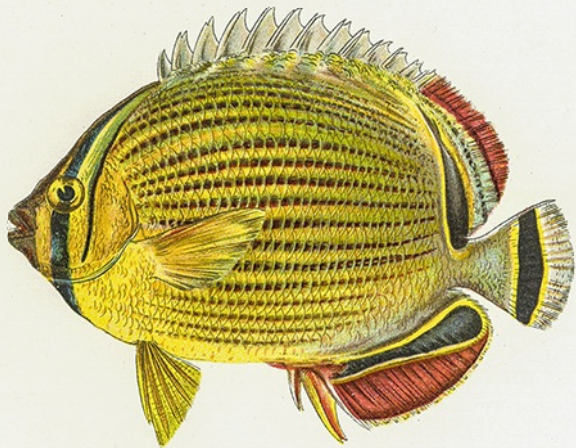

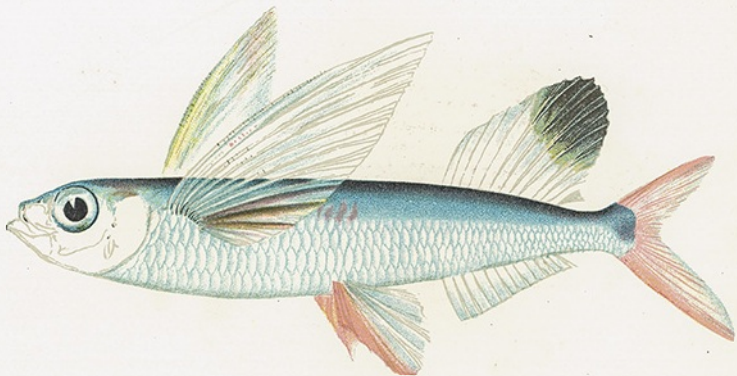
Hawaiian Fish Humuhumu.



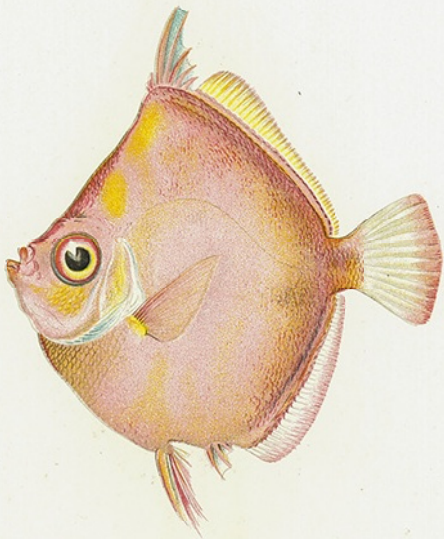
Hawaiian Fish Ulaula.



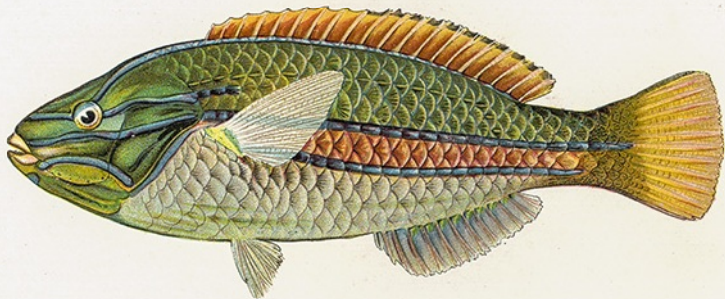
Hawaiian Fish Kapuhili.



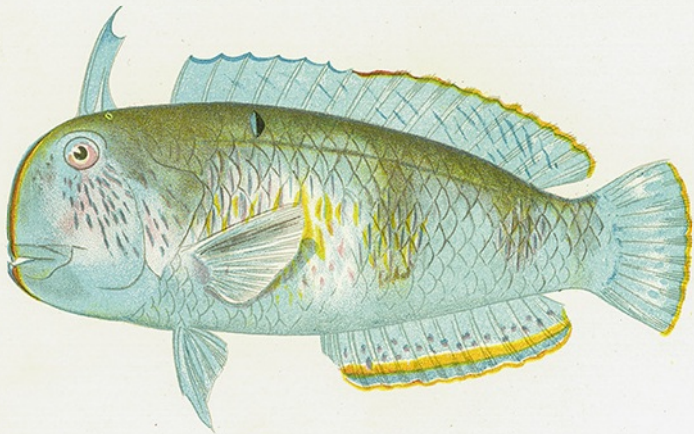
Hawaiian Flying Fish Malolo.

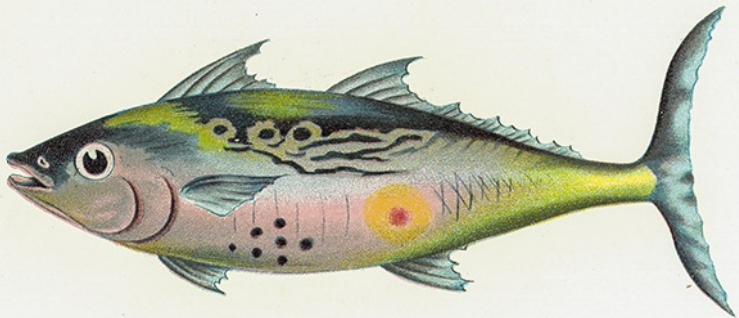

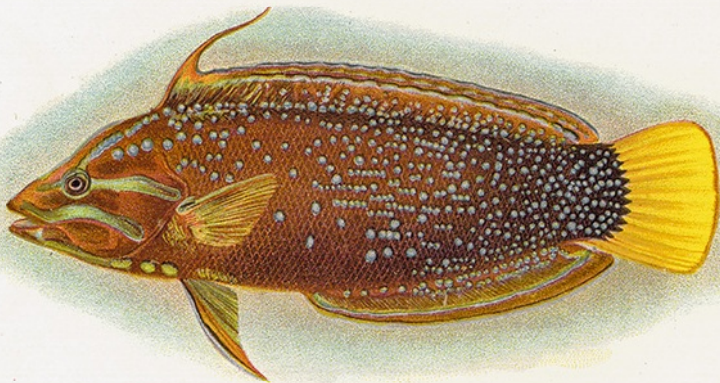

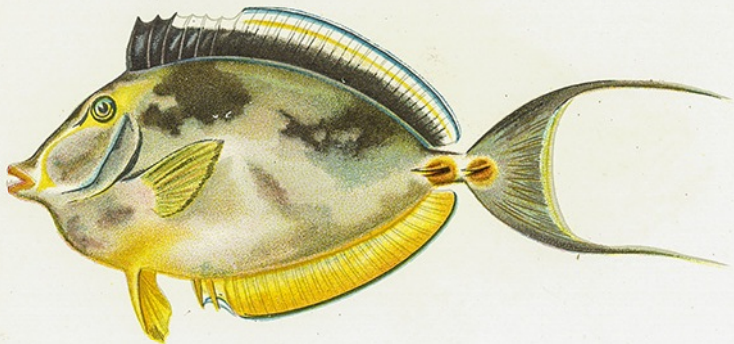

THE HONOLULU AQUARIUM



THE HONOLULU AQUARIUM is located in Kapiolani Park on the famous Waikiki Beach, five miles from the city. Electric cars pass the entrance.

There are over 400 varieties of fishes in Hawaiian waters. Of these many are remarkable in form and bewildering in color. The most brilliant colorings, unique patterns and violent contrasts of all imaginable combinations of shades are found in the island waters. The differences in shape and individuality are as great as the variety in the color scheme.

There are constantly on view at the Aquarium, from 600 to 1000 fishes of approximately 200 varieties. Those shown in the pictures published herewith are only a few of the most striking specimens shown in the Honolulu Aquarium.

The exhibit is most unique and beautiful and is visited by about 50,000 persons annually. It is the finest collection of fishes in the world.

"Language cannot do this subject justice. No words can accurately portray what one has seen here. The fish are odd in shape and have all the hues of the rainbow. The tints are laid on as if with a brush, and yet no painter could imitate them. No visitor to Honolulu should fail to see the Aquarium".

The Aquarium was built in 1904 by Mr. and Mrs. Charles M. Cooke on land donated for the purpose by Mr. James B. Castle, and was stocked and is maintained by the Honolulu Rapid Transit Company. The plant has cost over \$ 20,000 and is being added to and improved, from time to time. It is open throughout the week. An admission fee of 25 cents is charged. All receipts are devoted to operating, enlarging and improving the exhibit.

The United States Government has published an elaborate report upon the Fishes of Hawaii, written by Dr. David Starr Jordan, profusely illustrated, true to life.
